EARLY PITTSFIELD

Esther Elizabeth Strout

(Maplewood Prize Essay)

It was early in the summer of 1752 when, from an eastern mountain height, a pioneer viewed the great panorama below. The landscape, stretching away for fifty miles, was an enchantment of soft green, unbroken except where the Housatonic flashed in the sunlight, or some small, lonely lake rippled under a gentle summer breeze. Spots of darker green, where the boughs swayed stiffly in the wind, marked the numerous hemlock swamps. Every New England tree,—the maple, elm, chestnut, beech, linden, birch, hickory, spruce, red oak, and cherry,—could be distinguished by this woodsman in the scene that lay before him as he entered the Berkshires that day in June.

As he slowly descended the mountain side, perhaps he heard the growl of a bear, the cries of the wild-cat, or the hoot of an owl. His keen eye probably caught a brief glimpse of scores of rabbits, and of three or four different kinds of squirrels racing and chattering high in the tree tops.

These were but few of the many delights that met the pioneer as he approached his newly built cabin with his young wife and three-year old son mounted on the pillion behind him. Solomon and Sarah Deming had traveled many miles on horseback over an almost impassable trail, and, although at their new home no crowd would be gathered to greet them,—since Sarah was the first white woman to venture into the perils of this wilderness—they would be happy and most thankful when at last their humble abode should be reached. Sarah had been but seventeen when Solomon first took her from her father's home in Wethersfield, Connecticut, to the Green Mountains; but now at twenty-six she was entering the Township of Pontoosuck, Pittsfield's Indian name meaning "the run of the deer", to establish its first home here.

Captain Huston in 1738 had laid out in Pontoosuck sixty-four house lots, each of a hundred acres. A road, which now forms East and West Streets, ran from boundary to boundary and intersected, near the center of the town, a road which is now North and part of South Street. Another road, narrower than the other two, was parallel to the first and lay two hundred rods south of it. This was Honasada Street, which later became part of Elm Street. Here, on the north side of the street in the outskirts of the town, where Indians were a continual annoyance and terror to the neighborhood, was situated Mr. Deming's farm.

After the example of brave Sarah Deming, not many months passed before more courageous couples joined the Pontoosuck Plantation. That very summer one young couple, accompanied by a yoke of oxen and a dray carrying their household goods, journeyed for three days along a blazed trail and finally reached Pontoosuck and spent the third night at the Deming home. Often, in the absence of the men, wandering Mohegans threatened and demanded food and drink from the wives of the settlement, who could do nothing but shut and bolt the doors in their faces and pray for the protection of Providence.

Pontoosuck grew rapidly, and in September, 1752, Solomon Deming, Charles Goodrich, and a few other frontiersmen held the first meeting of the "Proprietors of the Selling

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Lots in the Township of Pontoosuck." But one morning in the summer of 1754, during the French and Indian War, Solomon brought home the dreaded news of Indian raids in neighboring Berkshire towns. Sarah quickly packed a little food and clothing and dressed baby Dorothy, the first white child born in Pittsfield, and five year old Noadiah for the flight. The settlement was saved, however, by the speed with which these daring adventurers escaped to Stockbridge where there were several fortified houses.

The Demings, accompanied by other venturesome families, returned to their home town in 1756, and here erected four fortified houses as a refuge when the "red menace" was on the war path. Due to the fortitude of these few early settlers, the town was saved and by 1758 all the first settlers were again safely situated in Pontoosuck.

Only nine years passed between the year when Solomon and Sarah came as Pontoosuck's first family and 1761 when Sir Francis Bernard, the English Governor of Massachusetts, named the newly made town, Pittsfield, after William Pitt, the famous British minister.

Years slipped by, and in 1818, shortly after the death of ninety-two year old Sarah Deming, Pittsfield erected an obelisk at the head of her grave in the burial ground near the site of her home. This historic spot is still visited by many interested in the life of the first woman who, as one side of her monument reads, "defended, in more than one instance, unaided, the lives and property of her family, and was distinguished for the courage and fortitude with which she bore the dangers and privations of pioneer life."

And now comes the end. The Junior Prom was the first social event of the Commencement Season; then graduation, and now the banquet. And behold! we are facing the cold, cruel world.

This, kind reader, is a brief history of the Class of June, '36 and our parting prayer is that our future may be as happy as these three years have been at Pittsfield High School.



Football

The football season of 1935 was, for P. H. S., one of the greatest in many years. We started with what appeared to be a rather weak combination and ended in a triple tie with Greenfield and Turner's Falls for the Western Massachusetts Championship. This was due to the rapid improvement of a green line, which early in the season came to rank with the veteran backfield. Though teamwork was the watchword of the champions, their success was aided by a large constellation of individual stars including "Pete" Kellar and "Steve", Trepacz, co-captains, and Ralph Polito captain-elect. Our boys filled six of the eleven berths on the All-Berkshire team.

In winning the first game from Lee 6-0 the team showed plenty of spirit and power as well as several ragged edges. A much smoother team snowed under Williamstown 34-0 in a game in which Coach Stewart left no one on the bench. The next week a veteran team from Albany Academy lost a desperate battle 6-0.

Then came the highly touted "Red Raiders" from Adams led by "Ray" Kowalski. Unfortunately he was alone in his worth, and as a team we played circles around them to win by 17-0. "Pete" Kellar's scholarly toe accounted for 5 points. Next a desperate Drury team made the game interesting until we applied the pressure to win 25-0. One Saturday later our ex-jinx from Poughkeepsie came up to take a 26-0 drubbing.

The "Blue Indians" from Turners Falls came next and almost spoiled the season as we found ourselves on the wrong end of a 6-0 score at the end of the third quarter. A 25-yard penalty and a smooth bit of teamwork in the line, resulting in "Joe" Gull's blocking a kick, gave us the ball on their three-yard line. Trepacz scored as usual and game ended 6-6.

On Thanksgiving Day the Purple and White lined up against the Purple and Gold in their classic battle. After a hectic half in which Barcz of St. Joe stole the ball from "Buddy" Evans and scored a legal touchdown, the Purple Elephants settled down to powerhouse football which resulted in a sustained drive to a "touchdown by Trepacz". Buddy got his revenge as he dove over a pile-up off right tackle for the winning point. Final score 7-6.

With the defeat of this ancient rival ended the partnership of one of the greatest teams ever to represent P. H. S. on the gridiron.

Basketball

The success of the boys on the hooped court was almost equally great as they suffered but three defeats during a long season. After winning from Holyoke in a double overtime game the right to represent western Massachusetts in the New England Championship tournament, the team, led by "Bob" Cusson, suffered its first defeat in the finals of that tournament. After their return from Burlington, they won the County Championship from Searles in two straight games. The series with St. Joseph's was somewhat of a disappointment. We won the first game on our own court but dropped the second in the miniature F. M. T. A. court. The parochial school boys won the final game to put the Purple and White hoopsters in the dilemma of being the champions of the county but not the city. Though there were no stars Captain Cusson and "Johnny" Foley were considered the classiest players in the county.

Hockey

Though the spirit was willing, the flesh was weak and our hockey team lost three out of five games. This showing may be traced to the lack of a proper place to practice. It is our hope that in the future something may be done to give the boys that want hockey a chance to play.

Tennis

Though they lost their first match to Williamstown, the tennis team has plenty of good material and should hold its own very well in this spring's schedule.

Track

Coach Carmody's charges, after showing promise by defeating Berkshire School by one point, won the Western Massachusetts Championship in a record breaking battle with West Springfield High. Our success was due to five first places earned by Hagstrom, Evans, Scullary, and Christopolis. Our other point winners were Betti, Ferland, Miller, Coradeschi. In winning the mile run, "Swede" Hagstrom set a new record of 4:37. Evans won both the 220 and the 100-yards dashes, setting a new record in the latter. With a vault of 11 feet, "Jimmy" Scullary topped the former meet record as he won the pole vault event for Pittsfield. To cap the record breaking spree, Christopolis broke the 120-yard low hurdle record formerly held by Zarvis of Pittsfield. The time was 14.7 seconds. With such a group of consistent performers as this, the season of 1936 should go down in history as being Pittsfield High School's greatest year in track as well as other sports.

Baseball

Coach Stewart's diamond proteges, who won the county championship with an undefeated season in 1935, have an excellent chance of winning the title again, but their season has been broken thus far by two defeats. The first was at the hands of Adams, who eked out a 6-4 victory; and the second by Drury, 3 to 1. Undismayed by these defeats Captain Gilligan's "boys" are adding zest to their play and are confident that, when the smoke of battle clears away from the county championship, the title will be wrapped in Purple and White.

"Bunny" leaped to first place in the junior and senior track meets, was the towering center of the successful varsity basketball team, and the spreading right wing of the victorious hockey team. As a fielder in baseball, she ensnared in her sure grasp all the fly balls that dared to approach her territory. And, lo and behold! she was a Shawn dancer, too. While we other mortals had to be content with one monogram, "Bunny" was awarded two of these enviable symbols. A squad leader's emblem was another achievement.

Another enthusiastic gymnast, noted for her remarkable agility, is *Theresa Ranti* ("Tess", to the crowd.) In baseball, when she wound up in true Dean fashion, her dazzled opponents had many anxious moments. The humorous touch in her technique will be long remembered. Other sports that shared her interest were basketball, bowling, hockey, and track. She was the popular captain in hockey, where no line of defense was strong enough to resist her plunging attack when she was intent on goals. Her crowning success was as champion bowler. She was a winner of the monogram (plus three letters) and of the squad leader's emblem.

A third accomplished athlete who earned a monogram was *Marie Nuciforo*, a fine, all around participant. In addition to earning the squad leader's emblem, she was an able performer in varsity basketball, baseball, hockey, and track. Her good sportsmanship was prominent.

Elinor Moynihan, girls' sports editor, also won the coveted monogram, squad leader's emblem, and was a devotee of Shawn.

Various honors were secured by the following:

Edna Wells was a member of the varsity baseball team and, in addition, she made the basketball squad, and was a squad leader. She earned a letter and two sets of numerals.

Dorothy Stead was the winner of a squad leader's emblem and numerals. Her sports were basketball, baseball, and hockey. "Dot" was a shining member of the Shawn dance group.

Elizabeth Purdy, of the famous "Extase" act, secured two sets of numerals and the emblem of the squad leader. Basketball, in which she made the squad, was her favorite sport.

Esther Strout was a lively forward in basketball and also took part in hockey and track. A set of numerals and a squad leader's emblem are among her trophies.

Anna Scelsi, diminutive but agile, did well in basketball, track, and hockey. She was a petite dancer in modern Shawn.

Eleanor Shill, a remarkable little miss, strove valiantly in hockey and baseball, and was an excellent bowler.

Elizabeth Weckman, Rhetta Fletcher, and Lillian Artz made the junior varsity baseball team, receiving their letters. "Betty" Weckman was a capable squad leader, as well.

Marguerite Fagley and Alicia Olinto were the class water nymphs, having made the Purple and White swimming team.

Other dancers in the Shawn class were: Gertrude Fish, Thelma Goodman, and Cecelia Roberts.

These brief notes cannot begin to indicate the fine merit in athletic endeavors. While students are playing together, poise and personality are unconsciously developing. Team play and its resultant cooperative spirit add to the good fellowship of high school days.

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
