Pesterday

EFORE the erection of the present Pittsfield High School building, there stood on this site one of those spacious old mansions that so well embodied the charm and gracious hospitality of early New England living. The house was "Pine Knoll", the home of the Honorable Thomas Gold, a distinguished lawyer and leading citizen of Pittsfield in the late eighteenth and early nineteenth centuries.

To "Pine Knoll" in the summer of 1843 came the poet Henry Wadsworth Longfellow with his young bride, Frances Elizabeth Appleton, who was a granddaughter of Mr. Gold. The mansion then stood in the midst of sloping green lawns and was surrounded by beautiful buttonwood and poplar trees. Through the entire ground story of the house from north to south ran a wide hall, while on the broad landing of the stairs passing from this hall up into the second story stood the tall, old-fashioned clock which the poet immortalized in the well-loved poem "The Old Clock on the Stair."






The Old Clock on the Stairs

Never—forever!"



Our Reighbors to the South

Picturesque Paraguay

(Maplewood Prize Essay)
Written by Lois Youngs

THE remote and romantic republic of Paraguay is one of the strangest and most interesting on the continent of South America. It is a country of gay flowers and luxuriant tropical forests, of beautiful birds and queer beasts. It is the country where time is but a word; where work means little or nothing; and where all the people, men and women alike, indulge in big, black cigars and sip yerba maté through silver tubes from small, gaily decorated vegetable gourds. It is to this unfamiliar land that we turn now—a land which has been scarcely touched by any of our dealings with Latin American countries and which has been left almost completely out of the picture in talk of present and postwar problems.

It is not strange that Paraguay attracts our interest, for it possesses a history which has made it fantastically unique. For many years it suffered under the heel of Spanish tyranny, and after it finally gained its independence, it soon met even greater disaster in the despotic rule of three military dictators and in the sweeping devastation of one tragic war. It was the last of this trio who led the Paraguayans into a violent war against Argentina, Brazil, and Uraguay, in which almost half of the population of Paraguay perished. The tiny republic has never recovered from the horrors of this war, and the people still discuss it in vivid detail.

Paraguay is one of two states of South America which are completely land-locked—a handicap which has been somewhat overcome by the use of the Paraguay and Paraná Rivers. The country itself covers an area of about sixty-five thousand square miles; however it also claims, in conflict with Bolivia, more than one hundred thousand square miles of a vast plain to the northwest known as "El Gran Chaco" which is valuable for its rich grazing land and flourishing forests. Most of Paraguay is covered with fertile hills and valleys, with deep, thick forests, and with groves of palm, orange, and banana trees.

Paraguay's industries, for the most part, depend upon its soil and the products of the land. Of greatest importance is the cultivation of yerba maté or Paraguay tea, the favorite beverage of South America. This product amounts to about ten per cent of the total exports from Paraguay. The leading commercial crop of Paraguay is tobacco, which grows luxuriantly in the rich, sandy soil in the west and, except for cotton, covers more acreage than the combined total for all other crops. Also important is the raising of cattle which supply hides and meat for home use and for export. In the abundant quebracho forests of Paraguay is found our best source of tannin, the most important forest product.

The population of Paraguay is smaller than that of any other South American state. The people are descended from the tribe of the Guarani Indians who dominated the Spaniards in the sixteenth century and exerted an influence over the people of Paraguay which exists strikingly in that country today. Most of the people speak Guarani in preference to Spanish, and all carry the unmistakable traits of the Guarani descent. They are an easy-going and light-hearted people, but when aroused, they become aggressively persistent and wildly violent. The poverty they live in is appalling, but because the land generously yields so many fruitful crops, the people are not starving as are those in the high mountainous regions of other South American states.

For a view of the people of Paraguay in their own picturesque environment let us look briefly at Asuncion, Paraguay's capital city. It lies along the banks of the Paraguay River comparatively untouched by the changing world around it and still retaining its charming Old World atmosphere. At first glance it presents a very pleasant picture—red-faced cliffs rising sharply from the water, crowned by the flat roofs of many low-lying, old-fashioned buildings; splashes of gaily colored flowers and trees painted against the broad green expanse of pasture land and the wild profusion of twining tangled forests. Inside the city itself the only signs of modern civilization are a few automobiles, which look strangely out of place beside heavily laden pack-mules and women riding donkeys to or from the market. This market is the center of all activity in Asuncion. It is to this place that the Paraguayans come to sell their wares, to purchase whatever their practically worthless money will buy, or to huddle about in groups and bring to life again the terrible war which took the lives of so many of their people. Barefoot vendors sit placidly on the ground surrounded on all sides by their endless variety of merchandise. This stream of life is typical of the peculiar ways and the delightful atmosphere which are Paraguay.

But Paraguay is not all primitive and backward. The people are quaint, but they are not without ambitions; the country is in many places wild and uncivilized, but it is not without a vast supply of many of nature's treasures. That these ambitions are to be realized, that these treasures are to be vital resources of the industrial world, are facts which present a challenge to the ingenuity and far-sightedness of the people of our country. With the safer and speedier methods of transportation that are every day being developed, it is not difficult to visualize the physical bond of unity which will connect us with this strange land, but it is not so easy to picture that tie which will form a spirit of honest good-will and co-operation between us and this country which is now so isolated from world affairs. However, if we show to the Paraguayans our desire to promote friend-liness and co-operation and put away all thoughts of exploitation, we shall have formed the biggest link in that bond of unity which will be beneficial to both.

Oct. 5—Chief Sullivan delivers a speech on discipline.


Oct. 12-Columbus has his day. We share it with him.





The Voting Machine

THE Class of 1944 Senior elections held on October 4, 1943, were unusual in at least one respect. The class used voting machines. These machines are owned by the City of Pittsfield and were used through the co-operation of Pittsfield's City Clerk, Mr. John Fitzgerald, and Mr. Claude Tuckey, a government man.

Pittsfield High School is the first high school in Massachusetts to use these machines in class elections, although they have been used in schools in other states.

The regular procedure of city elections was followed in the senior class elections.

There were ballot clerks who took the attendance when the seniors went to vote.

Names were checked from a voters list, and the voter was given a permit which allowed him to vote. This permit was handed to a person in front of the voting machines and the voter then stepped inside the curtains to vote.


At the bottom of the machine there is a master switch with a red knob on it. This switch is turned to the right closing the curtains and the voting begins. The names of the candidates for the various offices were arranged in rows with levers above the names. The voter pressed down the lever above the name of the candidate for whom he wished to vote, then turned the master switch to the left, thus registering his vote.

The officers elected were:

President, William Troy; First Vice President, Helen Beauchemin; Second Vice President, James Garivaltis; Secretary, Anne Fairfield; Treasurer, Jane Granfield.

Led by our class president, William Troy, we bowed our heads in silent prayer that God would protect and bless our troops and that a just victory would soon be ours.

Dedicated to the members of the Class of 1944 who are already serving in the armed forces, the Class Day program had as a background a huge map of the world, which by electrical control was illuminated to show all the parts of the globe where the boys of '44 are stationed. On a fictitious circum-global telephone the boys were called by proxy, and their favorite numbers featured on the program which follows:

Archery


