#### PVT. JEROME J. DIMISE

Inducted into the Army January 24, 1944, he took his basic training in Greensboro, North Carolina, and then entered upon an advanced gunnery course at Laredo, Texas. Here he was taken ill. First hospitalized at Brooke General Hospital at Fort Sam Houston, San Antonio, Texas, he was transferred to Lovell General Hospital at Fort Devens, Massachusetts, where he died April 10, 1945.






He entered the Army December 14, 1943, and trained at Fort McClellan, Alabama, and Camp Shelby, Mississippi. Assigned to a tank infantry division, he went overseas from Camp Meade, and was stationed in England from October, 1944, until he went to France in December, 1944. In France he joined the 10th armored division of General Patton's Third Army. Killed in action in Belgium December 27, 1944, he was awarded the Purple Heart posthumously.





#### PFC. GERALD J. DUBE



And unfolded itself on the other side.


The light, the dew, the broadening view Were found the same as they were before; And it lost itself in beauties new, Breathing its fragrance more and more.

# The American Bill of Rights

(Maplewood Prize Essay)

THE American Bill of Rights is recognized by every one of us as a document granting certain privileges or freedoms which make our country stand out above all others as a haven from oppression. We all enjoy these rights, but how many of us have ever stopped to analyze them or to wonder what life would be like if we were suddenly deprived of these freedoms which so vitally affect our daily lives?

The framers of the Constitution at first considered that certain rights were understood to be held by the citizens of the new republic, and omitted any iron-clad assurance of these privileges in the document. However, the people of the country demanded that the freedoms which had been secured by great bloodshed be preserved, for these settlers from the various countries abroad had been deprived of their liberties once and feared the same fate unless a written guarantee of their rights be expressed in the Constitution. Since the majority of Americans were familiar with the English Petition of Right and Bill of Rights, it was only natural that the American freedoms be expressed in a document of the same style.

Public opinion at that time did not favor the establishment of a strong central government, and the belief was that any government established must be "for the good of the whole". For this reason the states refused to ratify the Constitution until a check should be made upon Congress lest it overstep its delegated powers.

Shortly after the Constitution was ratified, following much opposition from the states, the Bill of Rights (for the most part the work of James Monroe) was prepared and finally adopted by the first Congress under the influence of Thomas Jefferson. The famous Virginia Bill of Rights provided the basis for the first ten amendments with the words "all men are by nature equally free and independent". The Declaration of Independence states in its opening sentences "that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty, and the pursuit of Happiness". The American Bill of Rights was to interpret these "unalienable Rights" and set before the people a detailed account of their rights and freedoms in the new republic.

In reverse of the natural order, the first amendment of the Bill of Rights is the key to the entire document, for it sums up in a single sentence the most significant principles of the American way of life.

The fundamental basis of any democracy is freedom of thought as guaranteed by freedom of speech, of public assembly, and of religion. Therefore, in the first amendment of the Bill of Rights this statement is set forth. Although freedom of religion, the first mentioned, was expressed originally to prevent the establishment of a state religion, it has come to be recognized as an outstanding attribute of this country today, one which has drawn to our shores thousands of persecuted peoples in search of a land in which they may openly worship God as they choose. The majority of the American settlers had been driven to our shores in search of religious freedom, and the leading statesmen of the country believed this freedom must be preserved in writing for posterity.

Speech and publication in America today are legally, though not completely free, because absolute freedom of speech in a country would create an anarchy. The character and reputation of a man must not be defamed in a democracy whose very principles were molded upon equality of man and respect for his ideals. This first amendment, however, gives any American the right to express within reason his thoughts upon various subjects in any proper place, either through papers or over the air, so they may be presented to the public. The purpose of the Bill of Rights is to protect these privileges.

The framers of the Constitution believed that government belonged to men, not men to the government. For that reason, they recognized the right of men to criticize the government and provided in this same amendment that people be given the right to assemble peaceably and to petition "for a redress of grievances". The meaning of this article, the most renowned section of the Bill of Rights, is fundamental—there can be no lasting social or governmental progress without freedom.

Into the seven following amendments are incorporated innumerable other rights and protection of rights already held. Among these are the right to keep and bear arms, protection from searches without a warrant, protection against excessive bail and punishments, and the provision that every individual be given the opportunity to prove his innocence in a trial by jury.

Since it is impossible to enumerate in one document all the privileges which the people possess, the ninth amendment provides that all rights held by the people be retained, while the last amendment reserves to the states and to the people all rights "not delegated to Congress or prohibited to the states."

Americans felt strongly about those rights then, as they do today. Although we have often taken these freedoms for granted, any threat that foreign powers might attempt to deprive us of our priceless liberties has made us conscious of the value of the guarantees of the Bill of Rights. As our fighting men who have returned to this country realize, the Statue of Liberty—our symbol of freedom—is the most beautiful sight in the world. This same feeling has stirred thousands of peoples from all countries to venture to our shores throughout the history of America in search of the great freedoms granted to the citizens of the United States by "the supreme law of the land."

The American is a lover of freedom. He left his home in the old world to seek it and has given his blood to protect it. America has been molded by the dreams of great men—dreams of opportunity, dreams of equality, dreams of freedom. It has been the dream of all men that they might follow in the path of freedom which America has pointed out to her children in the American Bill of Rights.

To Mr. Carey—An orange tie for a certain day in March!!!



## Class History

## SOPHOMORE YEAR




On September ninth, 1942, the gongs of Pittsfield High once more clanged out their peremptory summons to the seniors, juniors, and yes, us, the lowly sophomores gathered on the rainswept walk before that awe-inspiring institution which was to be our "second home" for three active years. Such was the first, inauspicious meeting of

the wartime Class of 1945.

Despite all efforts to avoid the title, this class was for the first week, typically sophomore. As such, our gullibility to the fantastic tales invented by scheming seniors was nothing unusual. Again, if we could be recognized by our undernourished forms, the blame lay, no doubt, on that ever active system of bells, buzzers, and gongs, which ousted us from our half-eaten lunches in a cold sweat over the fear of being tardy for class.

However, after those first anxious days, we became in many ways unlike any previous class. For the first time, a five period per week gym schedule was instituted to prepare boys for army life. Indeed, as sunken sophomore chests began to swell, both with muscle and pride, it is said that the quietude of certain study halls was several times interrupted by loud reports as overstressed shirt seams noisily

abandoned their onesided struggles against nature. Fortunately the establishment of a nation-wide scrap drive turned new born energies into constructive channels. Our herculean Victory Corps members teamed up with other students and in one Sunday produced a one hundred fortyfive ton answer to the metal shortage.


During this time, too, the girls weren't exactly resting on their laurels. Pythagorean theorems and congruent triangles in geometry became a cinch after the self-imposed task of neatly and accurately folding many shapes of Red Cross bandages.

Then, before we were aware even of its approach, our second sophomore term was upon us, and the year was wearing to an end with more and more outside tasks being added to our normal struggles with Caesar, Herberg, and Shakespeare. However, when summer finally arrived, we soon felt ourselves hankering for the old gang and the comparative regularity of school life.

## JUNIOR YEAR

As the Class of 1945 em-

barked upon its second year of high school, the increasing exigencies of war once more forced a deviation from the regular course of studies. At the insistence of the army, a class in machines was organized under the direction of Mr. Hennessy, with the result that soon a flourishing technical vocabulary was the proud possession of every junior. Even Mr. Geary kindly undertook the task of training the





boys (and certain individualistic girls) for battle conditions. Indeed, dodging hand grenades is tame compared with evading the superbly accurate eraser barrages loosed in Room 104.

Having accustomed ourselves to the tasks peculiar to intermediate algebra, second year languages, and third year English, the next step was a



rounding out of our nocturnal habits. Accordingly, Hi and Tri-Hi-Y charters were ceremoniously dusted off, and officers promptly elected. Perhaps these wee-hour activities shed some light on the alleged petition for sleeping facilities in study halls.

Then once more, the war resumed its pressure on Pittsfield schools. Regular col-

lections of tin cans and paper commenced, and in October, P. H. S. students headed up a city-wide salvage drive, which netted two thousand dollars' worth of tin, scrap iron, and rubber.

In November, a call arrived for the girls' aid in issuing War Ration Book IV. Thus it was that, as the fairer of the species labored over complex government forms, the masculine members of P. H. S. lived the life of Reilly for two brief school-free days.

We devoted the remaining tortuous weeks before Christmas vacation to

keeping our heads above water in our increasingly exacting studies.


In February, 1944, the Junior Class of 1945 held its carefully conducted elections for the various coveted class offices. From the heat of competition, that good-natured and sincere student, Bob Formel, emerged to claim the most noted position, that of Class President. Election methods were, as usual, patterned directly after regular municipal procedures and served as a splendid lesson in citizenship to all who participated.

In the same month, as a fitting answer to Uncle Sam's War Loan pleas, students of Pittsfield High bought and sold forty-five thousand dollars worth of War Bonds and Stamps. The School may well be proud of the fact that three Fairchild PT-19 training planes have, through



this effort, been purchased to serve in the name of our Pittsfield High School.

With these events over, the long awaited day of the Junior Prom soon arrived. On that memorable night in May, the class assembled and really "went to town" on good, clean fun. The Prom's success can be traced to no single source.



It emerged only from the labors of the several competent committees, under the chairmanship of Jim Tabor; from the skill and enthusiasm of Randy Blanchard's orchestra; and from the effect of spring on "youthful minds and hearts." The good time had by all certainly well justified the effort involved.

From the date of the Prom, affairs slowly tapered off, so that, by June, 1944, the Class of 1945 had successfully completed its second of the three difficult steps toward that long awaited day of graduation.

## SENIOR YEAR

As is usual in any large group of students, there seems to be in the Class of 1945, an outstanding youth who epitomizes the capabilities of an Einstein, Muzzey, and Longfellow put together. Thus, in the summer of 1944, as we scanned the local newspaper after a strenuous day's activities, we noted with interest that Alden Brosseau, our class "brain", had been selected to attend West Point. Alden well deserves and will make the most of this opportunity.



The start of our senior year was, unfortunately, delayed by a severe epidemic of infantile paralysis. Two weeks tardy, we found it necessary, upon our return, to to tackle immediately our new subjects, which, from the start, gave us little time to spend gloating over the latest influx of those "cute little sophomores."



This year, our Ring Committee came under the able guidance of Betty Gardner, and none too soon either, for we were tiring of our previous year's memento. Then too, what graduating class wants to be marked as lowly juniors by any outdated class ring?

In keeping with the spirit of the war effort, a determina-

tion to keep the Minute Man flag flying was shown once again as Al Totaro, the sports fan, assumed leadership of the Student Stamp Committee. Stamp and Bond sales reflected directly the influence of organized leadership, so judging from this, the committee's efforts have indeed been well spent.

We learned in October that the story of the vicissitudes of ardent lovers in a little Cornish village of long ago, would be portrayed in the operetta "Ruddigore," to be presented by the Class of 1945 under the exacting leadership of our musical director, Mr. Gorman. Soon, snatches from the script were being hummed throughout the school, particularly in the boys' gym, and as rehearsals progressed, an air of expectancy developed, which only increased as placards and posters blossomed in anticipation of the great event.

Also in October the voting machines were snapped into action before the determined onslaught of a duty-conscious Senior Class. Luckily, nothing gave way when a few neophytes, oblivious to the fact that the curtains were operated auto-

matically, attempted to yank them shut. Thanks to careful supervision, nothing went seriously amiss, so, after the prescribed checking procedure, the victors' titles were divulged. The students' choice for class president was able and conscientious Tom Evans. Rosemary Russell and Mike Spring were elected vice presidents, Susan

Szymanski, secretary, and Shirley Herd, treasurer.

Peering backward into the misty annals of time fifty years previous to our debut as the senior class, we discover our Alma Mater occupying a modest brick building on lower South Street. At that time, four classes totaled only two hundred twenty-five young men and women. But it was those pupils who, in their stiff, dark suits and long, full skirts composed and published in 1893 the first issue of The Student's Pen. Since then, The Pen has grown both in size and quality. In early 1944, it took top honors in the national competition conducted among school publications by the Columbia Scholastic Press Association. In November of 1944, The Pen published a special anniversary number with pictures of the sponsoring class of 1894. On this fiftieth anniversary of The Student's Pen, we could look back with





satisfaction on a half century of continued publication. "The tiny acorn has become a sturdy oak," said a member of the first staff, "and indeed a credit to The Pen's founders of long ago."

Meanwhile our regular school work was running its course. Our gun lovers were rapidly dispelling their illusions about "triggernometry," and Jane Howard was progressing favorably in Mr. Hennessy's machines class.

And, by the way, if various parties were observed snappily saluting each other, the action was not to be accredited to Mr. Lynch's militaristic doctrines. The incident marked one of those purposely conspicuous Hi-Y initiation pranks.

At last, as a refreshing air of gaiety pervaded the school, we finally gave vent to the Christmas spirit. Once again, a Christmas tree was secured to brighten our lobby with its dignified grace and fragrance. The scarcity of the customary decorations gave birth to the novel and effective idea of adorning the tree with tiny paper scrolls, each bearing the name of a Bond purchaser. On Wednesday, December 20, we met together for our annual Christmas program. Earl Proper sang in his deep voice "Holy Night", and Donald Davis "Ave Maria" in a steady tenor; and we, in our turn, released our Christmas emotions in appropriate selections from the time-honored, blue John Hancock carol booklets. As the last lingering notes of the band died away, we turned reluctantly to the three long periods between us and a joyous vacation. Needless to say, we accomplished little before dismissal.

In accordance with the tastes of American youth of 1945, January second, the day of our return, duly boasted a school alive with bright skirts, sweaters, plaid wool shirts and sizzling neckware.

After our return to school, that ominous cloud, which had been gathering on the horizon finally swept o v e r u s, a n d w e emerged from our de-

partmental tests, thankful that such events occur but twice annually.

During the winter season, sports were more than ever an integral part of school life. Besides the hotly contested meets of our regular school basketball team, almost daily struggles between the eight pioneer intramural groups were enacted at the Boys' Club court. Once more, the Ski Team came through with flying colors. On February third, at the State Forest, Pittsfield High literally walked (or, more aptly, skied) off with the Berkshire Interscholastic Ski Meet honors, scoring three hundred points against the nearest competitor's two hundred fifty.

February first and second were the two long-awaited days reserved for the operetta, "Ruddigore." Led by talented Evelyn Tainter and Chris Barreca, the two actual performances suitably culminated four months' effort by the cast, chorus and orchestra, under the exacting guidance of Mr. F. Carl Gorman. Here again, the high standards of previous years were upheld by the Class of 1945.

With the basketball season and the operetta concluded, the end of our days in Pittsfield High is definitely in sight. Yes, track, baseball, departmentals, and report cards still confront us, but they somehow appear relatively unimportant. For us seniors, there remain only two really important events—Class Day and Graduation. Remembering our feelings as sophomores and juniors at previous Class Day assemblies, we cannot suppress altogether a feeling of exaltation over the fact that this time, we shall be the ones envied. As for the latter event, our thoughts at this time are not clearly defined. Graduation day is akin to that thin blue line on the horizon, beyond which none can ever see.

#### Football 1944

A S far as the number of victories is concerned, the lot of the 1944 football team was not a happy one. The season got off to a dismal start with a thumping 27-0 defeat suffered at the hands of Greenfield. This was followed by a 12-0 bow to Springfield Tech. In the next game our boys hit paydirt as they trounced Dalton to the tune of 33-0. Then came a hard-fought battle on a rain-beaten field in Adams, with Pittsfield emerging on the short end of a 12-0 score. But in the following game Pittsfield hearts were gladdened as our boys scored a 6-0 upset victory over Drury. Then came an arclight campaign in Springfield, where we bowed to a powerful Cathedral High team 32-0. In the city-championship contest with St. Joseph's, Pittsfield was beaten 7-6 as Frank Koldys, a transfer from P. H. S., reeled off a 102 yard touchdown run for the Saints.

However, the deficit in the win column was more than balanced by the skill, thrill, and chill records. Against Adams, Pittsfield played a herculean defense, such as holding their opponents for four downs on the three yard line. A fifty yard runback by Vin Carpino of a recovered fumble against Tech will long be remembered.

Commendation for outstanding play should be given to Co-Captains "Mickey" McColgan and "Kinky" Gomes; to Don Broverman, Hugo Alessio, and Damon Phinney; and to all the squad members for clean sportsmanship and excellent team spirit. Our sincere thanks go to Coaches Carmody and Stewart for their fine work with the team.

#### Basketball 1944-1945


THE basketball team of 1944-45 played a much finer brand of ball than the rather disappointing .500 average would indicate. Although we have only the city championship to show for our efforts, the season was a great success from the spectators' point of view.

The season got off to a poor start as Pittsfield dropped successive road games to Williamstown and Bennington. The next two contests, which were played in the familiar surroundings of the Armory, resulted in hard-fought victories over Dalton and Drury High Schools. The following game was against undefeated Adams, which overpowered a "never-say-die" P. H. S. squad in a grimly contested engagement. In the first game of the City Series against our arch-rivals of St. Joseph in Pittsfield, the men of the Dome pulled a see-saw battle out of the fire as George Ditmar's foul shot with only seconds left to play put us on top 25-24. This contest was followed by an easy victory over a game St. Joe (North Adams) team, to finish the first half of the season.

The second half started like the first, as Bill "Poison to P. H. S." Hart led Williamstown to victory. Then came an avenging success over Bennington, which in turn was followed by heartbreaking 32-31, 36-30, and 45-40 losses to Drury, Dalton, and Adams respectively. The season came to a close with P.H.S. triumphs over St. Joe (N. A.) and St. Joe (P), the latter victory giving us the city title.

By far the outstanding game of the campaign was our second encounter with a highly favored Adams squad, which eventually finished the season without tasting defeat. In this game our valiant boys led almost to the finish, and only a supreme uphill fight saved Adams from a most humiliating defeat.

Credit for outstanding play must go to George Ditmar, Emil Fontana, and Leonard Ginsberg, and our hats are off to the entire team for a job well done.


#### Track, 1945

TRACK is considered a minor sport at Pittsfield High, but to the members of the team, it is not in this category. 
